Looking for a springtime quilt pattern full of motion and charm? This design combines **Quick-Pieced Flying Geese** and Triangle-Squares to create dynamic pinwheels and windmills spinning across the quilt top. Whether you choose bold, modern tonals or soft pastel prints, the interplay of these classic shapes will bring energy and movement to your quilt. Perfect for confident beginners and seasoned quilters alike, this pattern is a breeze to piece!

Use an accurate ¼" seam allowance throughout to ensure all elements of the quilt fit together well.

Shop

Fabric yardage assumes 40" usable width of fabric (WOF) unless otherwise noted.

- Light purple tonal 1/8 yd. for blocks
- Cream tonal 31/8 yds. for blocks
- Pink tonal 1/8 yd. for blocks
- Fuchsia tonal 1 yd. for blocks and binding
- Dark purple tonal 11/8 yds. for blocks
- Backing 4% yds.
- Batting 80" × 80"

Cut

Patches are lettered in order of use. Measurements include ¼" seam allowances.

- Light purple tonal 6 squares 13¼" (A)
- **Cream tonal** 72 squares 61/8" (B)
- Pink tonal 5 squares 13¼" (A)
- Fuchsia tonal 8 strips 2½" x WOF for binding 1 square 13¼" (A)
- Dark purple tonal 24 squares 6%" (B)



Sew

1. Referring to Quick-Pieced
Flying Geese in Sew Easy
Lessons and to Diagram I,
use 1 light purple tonal A
with 4 cream tonal B's to
make 4 Flying Geese 1's.
Make 24 Flying Geese 1's
total. Flying Geese should
measure 6½" × 12½".



3. Use the Flying Geese technique with pink tonal A's and cream B's to make 20 Flying Geese 2's and with the fuchsia tonal A and cream B's to make 4 Flying Geese 3's (Diagram III).

4. Sew 2 Flying Geese 2's together as shown in Diagram IV-A to make a block X. Make 8 block X's total. Block X's should measure 12½".

Sew 1 Flying Geese 2 and 1 Flying Geese 3 together as shown in Diagram IV-B to make a block Y. Make 4 block Y's total. Block Y's should measure 12½".


5. Referring to Quick-Pieced **Triangle-Squares** in **Sew** Easy Lessons and to Diagram V, use dark purple tonal B's and cream B's to make 48 units. Units should measure 6½".



6. Arrange 4 units as shown in Diagram VI; join to make 1 block Z. Make 12 block Z's total. Block Z's should measure 12½".

7. Arrange 3 block W's, 3 block Z's, 2 block X's, and 1 block Y as shown in Diagram VII. Join the blocks into rows; join the rows together to make a section. Make 4 sections total.

- **8.** Join the sections into rows; sew the rows together to complete the quilt top.
- Layer, baste, and quilt. Corrie machine quilted a floral motif across the entire quilt surface.


10. Bind the quilt.
